- TechWomen is an Initiative of the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA), launched in June 2011 by US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. The Institute of International Education (IIE) in San Francisco manages TechWomen on behalf of ECA.
- TechWomen brings emerging women leaders in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) from 21 countries in Africa, Central Asia and the Middle East together each year with their professional counterparts in the Silicon Valley and San Francisco Bay Area for a mentorship and exchange program.








TechWomen Results

as of 26 April 2016

- Jordan, Zimbabwe and Kazakhstan TechWomen 2016 Delegations (37 Mentors and 50 Fellows) interacted with 1,925 local women and girls
- 17 Initiatives already launched by 2015 TechWomen Fellows in six months since returning home
- 2,319 applications from 19 countries to be one of 90 TechWomen Emerging Leaders in October 2016
